► **Title Page [Page I]**

► **Are you self-publishing?** You may not have the particulars like the illustrator, or publisher yet, but it is good to start thinking about who you want to work with.

►If you are published by a traditional publisher they will provide this info.

►If you self-publish you will need an ISBN (it's a must!), registering with the Library of Congress and/or Archives Canada (recommended!), and copyrights and trademarks (also recommended!).

# DEDICATION PAGE

PAGE 3 - WRITE YOUR DEDICATION HERE

► **Your book will need a dedication! This is your chance to shout out someone who inspired you or holds a special place in your life.**

- ▶ **The best first lines are always amazing and grab the reader’s interest right away.**

- ▶ “2nd page” of your story! It will show opposite the last one. Two pages side by side is known as a spread.
- ▶ Some authors choose to make THIS page the “first one”. That decision is made usually if the text and illustrations work better that way.
